Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC)

On Thursday, June 9, 2011 the Upper Dublin **Township** Police Department successfully completed requirements necessary to be re-accredited for a 3 by the year term Pennsylvania Law **Enforcement Accreditation** Commission. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was officially recognized for this accomplishment and



awarded documents displaying this achievement by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission on behalf of the Pennsylvania Chief's of Police Association at their conference on July 13th.

The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, of the over 1,150 law enforcement agencies within Pennsylvania, approximately 300 agencies have enrolled in the program and only 76 agencies currently have attained accredited status. The members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department are proud to have attained this distinguished status.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department, under the direction of Chief Terrence P. Thompson, first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. At that point, Deputy Chief Lee Benson, a Patrol Sergeant at the time, was assigned the task of updating the policies and procedures of the Department. Within a matter of 18 months, the Department had an updated policy and procedures manual, a new police department facility, personnel properly trained on the new policies and procedures, and the proofs of compliance necessary to ensure that the Department was meeting the approximately 115 established standards. On May 21, 2005 the Upper Dublin Township Police Department



became state accredited law enforcement agency. initial Once accreditation achieved it must be maintained and the process of providing the necessary proofs of compliance resumes for a 3 year period. Detective Michael Gommer. Highway then Patrol Officer, was

assigned the responsibility of ensuring that the Department maintained its compliance with the accreditation standards. Detective Gommer successfully completed this assignment and on July 12, 2008 the Department was re-accredited by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. Once the Department maintained its re-accredited status, Patrol Officer David Madrak, was re-assigned as the Department's Professional Standards Officer. As the Department's Professional Standards Officers it is Officer Madrak's duty to manage the Department's accreditation program, as well as many other Department initiatives some of which include: grant management, personnel training, statistical analysis, and the Annual Report. As with any successful program, the accreditation program has evolved and expanded, and there are now approximately 132 standards to ensure compliance with.

On June 9th and 10th the Upper Dublin Township Police Department was evaluated by a team of accreditation assessors who received a tour of the police Department facility, reviewed Department policy and procedures, and proofs of compliance, as well as conducted ride-alongs and interviewed Department personnel. After this two day evaluation the accreditation assessors determined that the Upper Dublin Township Police Department successfully completed the requirements necessary to be re-accredited by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department will now be accredited through June of 2014, at which time it will once again be re-evaluated.

Chief Thompson sought to have the Upper Dublin Township Police Department become an accredited agency in order to provide the members of the Upper Dublin


Township community with a professional law enforcement agency that continuously strives to provide the best police services possible. Chief Thompson believes that by taking part in the accreditation program, the police department is open for inspection by assessment team members whose duty it is to scrutinize various aspects of the police department and to ensure compliance with the approximately 132 standards. The Department displays that it is an accredited law enforcement agency on its letterhead, vehicles, building, and on the officers' uniforms. Chief Thompson is proud of the members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department for maintaining the status of being an accredited law enforcement agency for this 9 year period.

According to The Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission's website, the accreditation program was designed and developed by professional law enforcement executives to provide a reasonable and cost effective plan for the professionalization of law enforcement agencies within the Commonwealth. Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. When the proper policies and procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals is assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.

Upper Dublin Township Police Department

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

The Department is charged with the protection of life and property within the Upper Dublin Township community. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a Pennsylvania first class, civil service, accredited, law enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours a day, 7 days a week, the Department employs 40 full-time sworn police officers, 6 Telecommunication Operators, 1 Records Clerk, and an Administrative Assistant to fulfill its mission.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consists of Patrol and Administrative Divisions with support units consisting of Investigations and Communications. The Department has many specialized units, as well.






Administrative Division

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is supervised by the Patrol Commander, Darren Nyce. The Patrol Division is comprised of 31 sworn officers who are divided into four seven officer squads, each under the direction of a Sergeant; in addition the Patro1 Division also consists of a Highway Patrol Unit and the Professional Standards Officer.



The Patrol Division's primary purpose is to respond to all emergency and nonemergency calls for service within Upper Dublin Township. Officers assigned to the Patrol Division utilize proactive policing activities that include criminal and vehicle statute enforcement, as well as crime prevention through high visibility patrol in order to protect life and property.



In addition, patrol officers also respond to mutual aid requests for from other assistance police departments. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has an outstanding working relationship with other law enforcement agencies and committed to assisting all service public professionals in the

performance of their duties. The Patrol Division seeks to provide the most professional and ethical law enforcement services to the Upper Dublin Township

community, thereby ensuring the preservation of peace and the highest quality of life in the community. As always, officer safety is paramount.

• Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol Unit consist of two dedicated highly officers whose primary responsibilities include addressing all traffic complaints, conducting directed patrols of those which locations in traffic violations and crashes are common, deploying speed trailers. conducting



commercial vehicle inspections on vehicles (i.e. trucks) that travel the roadways of Upper Dublin Township, conduct Aggressive Driving and Driving Under the Influence Enforcement details and analyze all reportable crash data.

Professional Standards

The **Professional** Standards Officer position was created in 2006. The Professional Standards Officer is the responsible for administration of the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement **Accreditation Program** as it applies to the Dublin Upper Township Police



Department. The responsibilities of this officer are to evaluate and develop policies and procedures that are of the highest quality, complete grant applications and ensure grant compliance, assist with administering Departmental training, serve as the Department's Quartermaster, assist with



community relations and the evaluation of school safety. complete any special projects assigned by the Chief of Police. The **Professional** Standards Officer has assisted the Chief of with Police the development of the Dublin Upper **Township** Police

Department's Annual Report, Brochure, and the Hazard Vulnerability Assessment of Upper Dublin Township.

Specialized Units

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department encourages officers within the Department to have additional duties that go above and beyond what is required of them in their general job The descriptions. Upper Dublin **Township** Police has Department many specialized units that allow the Department to expand its within the Upper reach Dublin Township community.



Some of the Departments Specialized Units include:

• Bicycle Patrol

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department Bicycle Patrol Unit was established in 1996. There are currently 18 officers who are assigned to the

Bicycle Patrol Unit, which is coordinated by Patrol Commander Darren Nyce. In order to become a certified Bicycle **Patrol** Officer, each officer must complete 32-hour rigorous basic Police Cycling Course sanctioned by International the Police Mountain Bike Association



(IPMBA). In addition, all officers assigned to the Bicycle Patrol Unit must remain current in all bicycle patrol skills through annual in-service training.

The Bicycle Patrol Unit is beneficial in patrolling those areas of Upper Dublin Township not accessible by police vehicles; these areas include Upper Dublin Township parks and recreation properties, Upper Dublin School District properties, golf courses and country clubs, and large wooded natural areas. Bicycle Patrol Officers are encouraged to ride as often as possible and to interact with the community as they do so.

Crime Scene Investigators

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has 9 officers that serve as crime scene investigators for their respective squads. These officers have received additional training on crime scene processing and have the equipment necessary to complete crime scene investigating.

• Crisis Intervention Specialists

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has 5 officers that serve as Crisis Intervention Specialists. These officers have completed 48 hours of training on how to understand and more efficiently assist a mental health consumer in crisis; this training was provided by Montgomery County Emergency Services.



• Drug Abuse Resistance Education (D.A.R.E)

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has D.A.R.E officers who instruct grade school students in all Upper Dublin Township public and parochial schools in the D.A.R.E The D.A.R.E program is program. coordinated by Juvenile Detective Michael Scarpato and is instructed by 3 patrol officers who are certified as D.A.R.E instructors.



• Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team

The Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team (EM

SWAT), formerly the Moreland Area Emergency Response Team, was created in 1989 as a special weapons assault team. The EM SWAT team comprised is 40 approximately officers from multiple iurisdictions within eastern Montgomery County. The Upper



Dublin Township Police Department has 10 officers who are voluntarily assigned to the EM SWAT Team, along with one vehicle. Upper Dublin Township Police Department EM SWAT officers are highly motivated and exceptionally trained both mentally and physically to handle life threatening incidents.

Quick Response Service

The Quick Response Service (QRS) Unit was established in 1991 in an effort to improve response times to emergency medical problems in Upper Dublin Township. The QRS Unit is coordinated by Corporal Andrew Lavenberg and there currently are



officers who are certified as Emergency Medical Technicians. The QRS Unit's utilizes a 2009 Chevrolet Suburban sport utility vehicle; this is a specialized police vehicle that contains more medical equipment then a typical police vehicle. In 2009, it was determined by the Pennsylvania Department of Health that the QRS Unit was in compliance with all of the standards of excellence set forth by the Pennsylvania Department of Health

as part of their voluntary recognition program for Quick Response Services and as a result certified the Department's QRS Unit through 2012.

• Field Training and Evaluation

The Field Training and Evaluation Unit is coordinated by Patrol Commander Darren Nyce and is comprised of 16 Field Training Officers (FTO). The Field Training and Evaluation Unit is intended to assist a "new" police officer with their transition from the academic setting to the performance of general law enforcement duties. While on probationary status newly hired

Dublin Upper **Township** Police Department Officers must successfully complete the Field **Training** and Evaluation program in order to attain Patrol Officer status. The Field Training and **Evaluation** program requires that officers



familiar with the personnel and equipment of the Department as well as the Department's policies and procedures. The Field Training and Evaluation program also provides the initial formal and informal training specific to the day-to-day duties of an officer. It is the responsibility of the FTOs, who have been specially selected and trained to conduct this type of training, to thoroughly review field training materials with the new officer and to demonstrate proper police procedures. This one-on-one style of training, and the fact that the FTO must guide the training in real law enforcement situations, sets it apart from any prior academic endeavors. In 2011, three officers successfully completed the Field Training and Evaluation program, thereby achieving Patrol Officer status.

Montgomery County Major Incident Response Team

The Major Incident Response Team (M.I.R.T) consists of police officers from multiple jurisdictions throughout Montgomery County. The members

of the M.I.R.T Team respond as needed to any natural disasters, riots, major events (i.e. presidential visits. sporting protests, etc.). and events, terrorist attacks that take place within Pennsylvania. There are 7 officers from the Dublin Upper



Township Police Department who are voluntarily assigned to the M.I.R.T Team. The Department is assigned and houses one vehicle for the M.I.R.T Team, which was purchased in 2008 by Montgomery County.

Montgomery County Drug Task Force

The Montgomery County Drug Task Force consists of police officers from multiple jurisdictions throughout Montgomery County. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has officers who are voluntarily assigned to the Drug Task Force. These officers are highly trained individuals who are responsible for the investigation and apprehension of those people that engage in the trafficking of controlled substances.

Use of Force

The Use of Force Training Unit is coordinated by Staff Sergeant Andrew Sanborn and consists of 6 officers who are specially trained and certified in the disciplines of Firearms, Defensive Tactics, Taser, and Impact Munitions. Uses of Force training programs are continuously being conducted with Department officers through classroom instruction and practical exercises in order to enhance their knowledge and skills in the use of firearms (i.e. handgun and long gun), defensive tactics (i.e. handcuffing, self-defense, baton, and pepper spray, etc.), Taser and the 12-gauge super sock shotgun. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department seeks to provide its officers with the most up-to-date training in order to protect themselves and the Upper Dublin Township community.

Training

Upper Dublin Township Police Department personnel undergo training throughout their career in law enforcement. Staying abreast of changes within the law enforcement discipline is an on going process and it is the responsibility of the Department to train all officers in their core tasks within their job description. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department's mission of serving the public is greatly enhanced through its dedication of keeping its officers fully trained and equipped in order to meet the changing needs within the law enforcement community.

Community Oriented Policing

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a strong proponent of Community Oriented Policing. Community Oriented Policing is a philosophy that promotes organizational strategies, which support the use of partnerships and problem-solving techniques within the community to proactively address public safety issues such as crime, social disorder and the fear of crime.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has instituted a variety of community oriented policing strategies to educate people within the Upper Dublin Township community in the areas of crime prevention, substance abuse, vacation home checks, and firearm safety; in addition, the Department also offers bicycle, vehicle, school and work-place safety seminars. Furthermore, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department encourages officers to "park and walk" or bicycle throughout the neighborhoods and business centers of Upper Dublin Township in order for the public to have an opportunity to interact with the officers.

• Upper Dublin Police National Police Week Commemoration Night

In May the Upper Dublin Township Police Department hosted its annual "Open House" in commemoration of National Police Week. This year's

event featured numerous law enforcement agencies which displayed their equipment, vehicles and personnel to the public in order to educate about police duties. them Some of those agencies in attendance included the Horsham Township Police Department, Lower Gwynedd Township Police Department, **Township** Montgomery



Police Department, Cheltenham Township Police Department, the Pennsylvania State Police, Fort Washington Volunteer Fire Company, Ambler Community Ambulance, the Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team and the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety. It is estimated that there were over 300 people who attended the event. Retirements

After 30 years of service to the Upper Dublin Township community, Sergeant William D'Arcy retired from the Upper Dublin Township Police Department.

Sergeant William D'Arcy was hired by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department on February 11, 1981. Sergeant D'Arcy was one of



eight officers hired that year by Upper Dublin Township. Previous to Upper Dublin, Sergeant D'Arcy was a dispatcher at the Montgomery County Emergency Services Center.

In March of 1992 Sergeant D'Arcy was promoted to Patrol Sergeant, a capacity that he served in until his retirement. Sergeant D'Arcy served as the first aid and CPR instructor for the police department; was the Department's Quick Response Service Coordinator, a member of the Department's Bicycle Patrol Unit and also served as a member of the Montgomery County Major Incident Response Team.

While employed at Upper Dublin Township, Sergeant D'Arcy earned an Associates degree in Police Science from Montgomery County Community College, a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Temple University, Master's degree in Criminal Justice Administration from Saint Joseph's University and his Teaching Certification from Arcadia University. In 1999 Sergeant D'Arcy attended the "197" session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's National Academy.

Commendations

Commendations are awarded to Upper Dublin Township Police Department personnel in recognition of and appreciation for outstanding acts of public service.

• On May 31st, a student who attends Upper Dublin High School collapsed during class and was in cardiac arrest; the incident was so severe that doctors said very few people survive such incident. Arriving on scene to assist with the medical emergency was Andrew Corporal



Lavenberg and Officer Thomas (T.J.) Miller. As the student began to turn blue, Corporal Lavenberg and Officer Miller applied a bag-valve mask and provided oxygen to the student. As a result of Corporal Lavenberg's and Officer Miller's actions, the student survived. On August 15th Corporal Lavenberg and Officer Miller were presented with an award from the Upper Dublin School District as a result of their live saving actions.

Hiring

In order for a vacant police officer position within the Upper Dublin Township Police Department to be filled, Civil Service rules established by the Upper Dublin Township Civil Service Commission must be followed. Candidates for the position of police officer must be placed onto the Civil Service list that is complied after a candidate has successfully complete the following: a written test, an interview with members of the police department which consists of supervisors and command staff, a physical fitness test, an in-depth background investigation, a polygraph test and a psychological as well as medical exam. Once the candidate has been selected and appointed to the position of probationary police officer, that person is then assigned to attend a Municipal Police Academy or placed directly into the Department's Field Training and Evaluation Program. The above process is long and arduous and typically takes up to 1 year to complete.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was authorized by the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners to fill 3 police officer vacancies within the Department during 2011.

• In February, Officer Michael Ciuffetelli was hired by the Officer Department. Ciuffetelli is a graduate of the Rochester Institute of Technology, where he earned Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice, as well as an Associate of Art's



degree in Photography with a minor in Communications. Officer Ciuffetelli was previously employed as a law enforcement officer in New Jersey, with the Burlington County Sheriff's Department and the Riverside Township Police Department. Officer Ciuffetelli successfully completed the Upper Dublin Township Police Department's Field Training and Evaluation Program and was immediately assigned to Squad A. Officer Ciuffetelli is a fine officer who has done an outstanding job protecting the Upper Dublin Township community.






Fiscal Responsibility

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is aware of the impact police services have on the Upper Dublin Township budget. Every member of the Department seeks to be fiscally responsible. We take very seriously the task of "spending wisely". The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is constantly applying for alternate sources of financial support for equipment, technology, training, and personnel. The Department applies for grant funding through federal and state agencies that have programs directed for law enforcement activities. To date the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has secured grant monies in excess of \$ 1,000,000.00. These grant funds directly reduce the amount of tax dollars that fund police operations.





Table 10. Directed Patrols, Property Checks, and Foot Patrols




➤ The graph above displays officer initiated proactive policing activities.

➤ The graph above displays the traffic citations or warnings that were issued as a result of a vehicle code violation by a motorist.





Table 13. Reportable and Non-Reportable Crashes



Table 15. Aid to Other Law Enforcement Agencies




➤ The graph above displays calls for service relating to aid provided to other law enforcement agencies by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. Some of these agencies include:


