

## Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC)

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department, under the direction of Chief Terrence P. Thompson, first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. Since then, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department received initial accreditation in May of 2005 and has retained its accredited status with assessments and certifications in July of 2008 and June of 2011.







The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

The Department is charged with the protection of life and property within Upper Dublin Township. The



Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a Pennsylvania first class, civil service, accredited, law enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours a day, 7 days a week, the Department employs 41 full-time sworn police officers, 6 Telecommunication Operators, 1 Records Clerk, and an Administrative Assistant to fulfill its mission.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consists of Patrol and Administrative Divisions with support units consisting of Communications, Highway Patrol, and Investigations. The Department has many specialized units as well.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department maintains a "Community Oriented Policing" philosophy through the dedication and service of its members.





## Organizational Chart – Patrol Division





### **Patrol Division**

The Patrol Division is supervised by the Patrol Commander, Sergeant Darren Nyce. The Patrol Division is currently comprised of 29 sworn officers. There are four seven officer squads, each under the direction of a Sergeant with support provided by a Corporal which allows for a clear and concise chain command. In addition the



Patrol Division also consists of a Highway Patrol Unit and the Professional Standards Officer.

The Patrol Division's primary purpose is to respond to all emergency and nonemergency calls for service within Upper Dublin Township. Officers assigned to the Patrol Division utilize proactive policing activities that include criminal and vehicle statute enforcement, as well as crime prevention through high visibility patrol in order to protect life and property.

In addition, patrol officers also respond to mutual aid requests for assistance from other police departments. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has an outstanding working relationship with other law enforcement agencies and is committed to assisting all public service performance of their duties. The Patrol Division seeks to provide the most professional and ethical law enforcement services to the Upper Dublin Township community, thereby ensuring the preservation of peace and the highest quality of life in the community. As always, officer safety is paramount.

#### Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol Unit consist of two highly dedicated officers whose primary responsibilities include addressing all traffic complaints, conducting directed patrols of those locations in which traffic violations and crashes are common, deploying speed trailers, conducting commercial vehicle inspections on vehicles (i.e. trucks) that travel the roadways of Upper Dublin Township, conduct Aggressive Driving and Driving Under the Influence Enforcement details and analyze all reportable crash data.

Professional Standards Officer is responsible for the administration of the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program as it applies to the

Upper Dublin Township **Police** Department. The responsibilities of this officer are to evaluate and develop policies and procedures that of the highest are quality, complete grant applications and ensure grant compliance, assist administering with Departmental training, serve as the



Department's Quartermaster, assist with community relations, the evaluation of school safety, coordinate the deer management program, and complete any special projects assigned by the Chief of Police. ## Community Oriented Policing

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a strong proponent Community of Oriented Policing. Community Oriented Policing is a philosophy that promotes organizational strategies. which support the use of partnerships and problemsolving techniques within the community to proactively address public safety issues such as crime, social disorder and the fear of crime.



The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has instituted a variety of community oriented policing strategies to educate people within the Upper Dublin Township community in the areas of crime prevention, substance abuse, residence checks, and firearm safety; in addition, the Department also offers bicycle, vehicle, school and work-place safety seminars. Furthermore, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department encourages officers to conduct foot or bicycle patrols throughout the neighborhoods and business centers of Upper Dublin Township in order for the public to have an opportunity to interact with the officers.

#### • Upper Dublin Police National Police Week Commemoration Night

In May the Upper Dublin Police Township Department hosted its annual "Open House" in commemoration ofNational Police Week. Sergeant Andrew Lavenberg did an excellent coordinating job year's event. This year's event featured numerous law enforcement agencies which displayed their equipment, vehicles



and personnel to the public in order to educate them about police duties. The 3<sup>rd</sup> annual Upper Dublin Police Department family softball picnic and game was held in June. The day began with a softball game featuring the Upper Dublin Police Department's finest versus members of the Fort Washington Volunteer Company. This year,

### Graduations

In addition, he successfully completed the "Yellow Brick Road," which consisted of eight challenges

Patrol Commander Nyce has served with the Upper Dublin Township Police Department for 16 years; currently he supervises the 30 member Patrol Division. Prior to his assignment to the position of Patrol Commander, he served as a Corporal and Sergeant; in addition he also serves as the coordinator of the Field Training Officer program, a Bicycle Patrol Officer, a member of the Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team, a member of the Montgomery County Drug Task Force, and a Montgomery County Emergency Vehicle Driver's Course instructor.

The Upper Dublin Police Department now has two members of the Command Staff who have successfully completed the F.B.I National Academy, Patrol Commander Darren Nyce and Deputy Chief Lee Benson.

Sergeant Michael Janoski, a 20 year veteran of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department, graduated from the School of Police Staff and (SPSC) Command University. Northwestern Sergeant Janoski was a student in SPSC Class #326, which had a total of 48 students, who this completed ten-week Sergeant Janoski course. currently supervises Platoon C

## Hiring

In order for a vacant police officer position within the Upper Dublin Township Police Department to be filled, Civil Service rules established by the Upper Dublin Township Civil Service Commission must be followed. Candidates for the position of police officer must be placed onto the Civil Service list that is complied after a candidate has successfully complete the following: a written test, an interview with members of the police department which consists of supervisors and command staff, a physical fitness test, an in-depth background investigation, a polygraph test and a psychological as well as medical exam. Once the candidate has been selected and appointed to the position of probationary police officer, that person is then assigned to attend a Municipal Police Academy or placed directly into the Department's Field Training and Evaluation Program. The above process is long and arduous and typically takes up to 1 year to complete.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was authorized by the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners to fill a police officer vacancy within the Department in 2012.

In June, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department hired Officer Stephen Pimm. Officer Pimm is 25 years old and originally from Tampa, Florida. Officer Pimm attended Villanova University on an athletic scholarship and played football for the Wildcats as the team's tight end. In May of 2009, Officer



Pimm graduated from Villanova University with a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice. Prior to being hired by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department, Officer Pimm served for two years with the Warrant Unit for the First Judicial District of Pennsylvania. Officer Pimm will wear badge # 92.

## Retirements

After a 24 year career with the Upper Dublin Township Police Department, Detective Kenneth Whisler has retired.

Graduating in 1981 from the Pennsylvania State Police Academy, Detective Whisler began his career as a full-time police officer with Ambler Borough in the fall of 1980, While working for the Ambler

In March of 1988, Detective Whisler was hired by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. By accepting employment with the Department, Detective Whisler had opportunity to expand his career interests. As a Patrol Officer, Detective Whisler was eager to get involved in many different aspects of the Department. Detective Whisler became a member of the Traffic Safety Unit and shortly thereafter used his Emergency Medical Technician Certification and experience to become a member of the Department's Quick Response Service Medical Unit. Detective Whisler's career progressed with assignments as a Field Training Officer, a Highway Safety Officer, an Upper Dublin Police Department Tactical Team member and a member of the Moreland Area Emergency Response Team where he served as the team's first Tactical Medic. Detective Whisler also served as a member of the Attorney General's BNI Task Force and as a member of the Montgomery County District Attorney's Drug Task Force. Detective Whisler also participate in the Upper Dublin Township Police Department's Teen Driving Program as a Teen Driving Instructor.



## Fiscal Responsibility

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is aware of the impact police services have on the Upper Dublin Township budget. Every member of the Department seeks to be fiscally responsible. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is constantly applying for alternate sources of financial support for equipment, technology, training, and personnel. The Department applies for grant funding through federal, state, and local agencies that have programs directed for law enforcement activities. To date the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has secured grant monies in excess of \$ 1,000,000.00. These grant funds directly reduce the amount of tax dollars that fund police operations.





Table 11. Directed Patrols, Property Checks, and Foot Patrols





Table 12. Alarm Activations and False Alarms







Table 14. Reportable and Non-Reportable Crashes








