## Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC)

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department, under the direction of Chief Terrence P. Thompson, first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. Since then, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department received initial accreditation in May of 2005 and has retained its accredited status with assessments and certifications in July of 2008 and June of 2011.

The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement



Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, of the approximate 1,150 law enforcement agencies within Pennsylvania, approximately 300 agencies have enrolled in the program and approximately 85 agencies are accredited. The members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department are proud to have attained this distinguished status.

According to The Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission's website, the accreditation program was designed and developed by professional law enforcement executives to provide a reasonable and cost effective plan for the professionalization of law enforcement agencies within the Commonwealth. Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. When the proper policies and procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals is assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.



## Upper Dublin Township Police Department

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

The Department is charged with the protection of life and property within Upper Dublin Township. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a Pennsylvania first class, civil service. accredited. enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours a day, 7 days a week, the Department employs 40 full-time sworn police officers, Telecommunication Operators, 1 Records Clerk. Administrative and Assistant to fulfill its mission.



The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consists of Patrol and Administrative Divisions with support units consisting of Communications, Highway Patrol, Investigations, and Professional Standards. In addition, the Department has many specialized units as well.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department maintains a "Community Oriented Policing" philosophy through the dedication and service of its members.





## Administrative Division

The Administrative Division is supervised by Deputy Chief Ralph (Lee) Benson. The Administrative Division responsible for budgeting, personnel, data processing, management, facilities statistics. purchasing, and communications. The Administrative Division consists of Communications and Records Detectives, personnel.




The Communications and Records Units are staffed by civilian personnel who are committed to providing professional services to the public. The Communications Unit is responsible for the answering of telephone calls, data entry, facility security through viewing the closed circuit security system, and the supervision of prisoners. The Records Unit maintains and/or responds to request for reports generated by patrol officers and detectives to include: crash, incident, and investigative reports, criminal arrest files, criminal records, parking tickets, and citations. The Records Clerk receives telephone calls, completes data entry, reviews files, scans documents, and assist the public with questions or request they may have upon their arrival at the Department.

The Detective Unit provides specialized investigative support to the Patrol Division. The members of the Detective Unit perform both initial criminal investigations and follow-up investigations involving adults and juveniles. Detectives conduct initial investigations of serious crimes, and conduct follow-up investigations when time, geography, or manpower restraints prevent patrol officers from continuing the investigation.

The Detective Unit utilizes a case management system to effectively manage criminal investigations conducted by both detectives and patrol officers. Other major functions of the Detective Unit include crime scene processing, evidence and property management, and juvenile justice programs.

- ➤ The table above provides the source as well as the number of Calls for Service received through the Upper Dublin Township Police Department's Communications Center.
- ➤ On Tuesday, February 5, 2013 the Upper Dublin Township Police Department transferred police dispatch responsibilities to the Montgomery County Communications Center. All "Calls for Service" are now dispatched to Upper Dublin Police Officers via the Montgomery County Communications Center. The Upper Dublin Police Department remains open and staffed on a continuous basis; however the business telephone number is now 215-646-2101.

## **Patrol Division**

The Patrol Division is Patrol supervised by Commander Darren Nyce. The Patrol Division is currently comprised of 31 sworn officers. There are four seven officer squads, each under the direction of a Sergeant with support provided by a Corporal which allows for a clear and concise chain of command. In addition the Patrol Division also consists of a Highway Patrol Unit and the Professional Standards Officer.



The Patrol Division's primary purpose is to respond to all emergency and nonemergency calls for service within Upper Dublin Township. Officers assigned to the Patrol Division utilize proactive policing activities that include criminal and vehicle statute enforcement, as well as crime prevention through high visibility patrol in order to protect life and property.

In addition, patrol officers also respond to mutual aid requests for assistance from other law enforcement agencies. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has an outstanding working relationship with other law enforcement agencies and is committed to assisting the public in the performance of their duties. The Patrol Division seeks to provide the most professional and ethical law enforcement services to the Upper Dublin Township community, thereby ensuring the preservation of peace and the highest quality of life in the community. As always, officer safety is paramount.

#### Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol Unit consist of two highly dedicated officers whose primary responsibilities include addressing all traffic complaints, conducting directed patrols of those locations in which traffic violations and crashes are common, deploying speed trailers, conducting commercial vehicle inspections on vehicles (i.e. trucks) that travel the roadways of Upper Dublin Township, conduct Aggressive Driving and Driving Under the Influence Enforcement details and analyze all reportable crash data.

#### Professional Standards

Professional Standards Officer is responsible for the administration of the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program as it applies to the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. The responsibilities of this officer are to evaluate and develop policies and procedures that are of the highest quality, complete grant applications and ensure grant compliance, assist with administering Departmental training, serve as the Department's Quartermaster, assist with community relations, the evaluation of school safety, coordinate the deer management program, and complete any special projects assigned by the Chief of Police. The Professional Standards Officer has assisted the Chief of Police with the development of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department's Annual Report, Brochure, and the Hazard Vulnerability Assessment of Upper Dublin Township.

## **Commendations**

Commendations are awarded to Upper Dublin Township Police Department personnel in recognition of and appreciation for outstanding acts of public service.

they observed a vehicle, parked in the driveway of a home that was engulfed in flames. As the officers approached the vehicle, they observed the driver of the vehicle, semi-conscious, and sitting in the driver's seat. The officers were able to remove this individual from the vehicle, seconds before the gas tank of the vehicle exploded, fully engulfing the interior of the vehicle. The officers carried the individual to a safe area where medical attention was provided.

This serial burglar was arrested after a police pursuit that led to a home in Northeast Philadelphia. The serial burglar was believed to be responsible for more than 100 burglaries in region, to include: Abington, Cheltenham, Horsham, Montgomery, Lower Gwynedd, Springfield, Towamencin, Upper Gwynedd, and Whitemarsh Townships, along with locations in Delaware County, Pennsylvania and New Castle County, Delaware.

Corporal Shea Creamer, of Upper Dublin **Township** Department Police and a Team Leader Eastern with the Montgomery County Special Weapons and **Tactics** Team, Staff honored Sergeant Andrew Sanborn with

The commendations were awarded due to the actions of these officers on July 4, 2013 at the Oreland Fourth of July Parade. Each member was serving as bicycle patrol officer during the parade. The bicycle patrol officers ride the route of the parade, which begins in Upper Dublin Township and Springfield ends in



Township, for security and also to take part in the parade activities. At

approximately 11:23 hours Detective Gommer was stopped on Roesch Avenue near Bruce Road, Springfield Township, by a parade attendee who sought help with a man he believed to be in heat distress.

Detective Gommer arrived on-scene to find the man lying face down. Detective



Gommer quickly determined that the individual was in cardiac arrest. Detective Gommer immediately began administering CPR while simultaneously requesting additional assistance from bicycle patrol officers and emergency medical services. Once assistance arrived, Detective Gommer continued CPR while EMS units prepared to transport the individual to a hospital and the other bicycle patrol officers assisted the family of the man and created a safe lane of travel for the ambulance to leave. As Chief Thompson and Deputy Chief Benson have both stated, "There's no question Detective Gommer saved [the man's] life."



## **Community Oriented Policing**

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a strong proponent of Community Oriented Policing. Community Oriented Policing is philosophy promotes that organizational strategies, which support the use of partnerships and problemsolving techniques within the community to proactively address public safety issues



such as crime, social disorder and the fear of crime.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has instituted a variety of community oriented policing strategies to educate people within the Upper Dublin Township community in the areas of crime prevention, substance abuse, residence checks, and firearm safety, in addition to also conducting bicycle, vehicle, school and work-place safety seminars. Furthermore, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department encourages officers to conduct foot or bicycle patrols throughout the neighborhoods and business centers of Upper Dublin Township in order for the public to have an opportunity to interact with the officers.

• College Internship Program

The Upper Dublin **Township** Police Department is committed to developing partnerships within the Upper Dublin Township community and beyond. With this in mind, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department is one of only a small number enforcement of law agencies in the region to offer College a



Internship Program. Through the College Internship Program, the Department builds partnerships with colleges and universities and benefits, along with the college interns, from shared educational experiences.

The objective of the College Internship Program is to provide a positive learning environment, in which interested college students can experience the various aspects and responsibilities of law enforcement while completing a project as part of their studies. The Department strives to offer a quality educational experience by providing the student with a "hands on" learning environment and enhancing their understanding of the criminal justice system.

The College Internship Program is coordinator by the Deputy Chief of Police and addressed by a Department policy. All applicants must be at least 18 years of age, enrolled full-time in an accredited college or university, maintain an overall minimum grade point average of 3.0 on a scale of 4.0 in their curriculum, enrolled in a criminal justice program or related course of study, and free of any felony or misdemeanor arrests or convictions. College interns do not receive any compensation or benefits and must provide to the Department copies of any journals or reports that they complete related to their time enrolled as a College Intern at the Department. College Interns typically spend 8-24 hours a week for approximately 15 weeks at the Department. College Interns will observe the functions of both the Administrative and Patrol Divisions and each of their respective units.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department's College Internship Program has been in place for many years. There are currently two Upper Dublin Township Police Officers who completed their College Internships at the Department. Sergeant Daniel Wade, with 15 years of service, supervises Platoon B, and Sergeant Andrew Lavenberg, with approximately 10 years of service, supervises Platoon A. In addition, many of the College Interns who have successfully completed the Department's College Internship Program are currently law enforcement officers with local, state, or federal law enforcement agencies.

In 2013, both Chestnut Hill College in Philadelphia and Kings College in Scranton, Pennsylvania each had a college student successfully complete their internships at the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. With the completion of their internship, each student had better insight into the criminal justice system and possible careers in law enforcement.

#### • Junior Police Academy

The Upper Dublin **Police Township** Department held its 18<sup>th</sup> Junior annual Police Academy on Monday, August 5 and Tuesday, August 6, 2013. The Junior Police Academy was coordinated Detective Michael Scarpato, with assistance from Officer Madrak David and Police Communications



Officers Mark Lesniak and Ryan Copelin. This year's events for the Junior Police Academy included a presentation by Upper Dublin Police Officer Stephen Dempsey, a tour of the police station, a police vehicle, a Fort Washington Volunteer Fire Company fire engine, and an Ambler Community Ambulance Association ambulance. There was also a K-9 demonstration given by Officer Brian Schreiber and K-9 Bauer of the Montgomery Township Police Department. In addition, a tactical demonstration was provided by Corporal Shea Creamer of the Upper Dublin

Township Police Department on behalf of the Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team. At the conclusion of the Junior Police Academy there was an awards ceremony, a pizza party, and a bicycle rodeo.


## • National Police Week Commemoration Night

On Monday, May 13, 2013 the Upper Dublin Township Police Department hosted its annual "Open House" in commemoration of National Police Week. This year's event featured numerous law enforcement agencies



which displayed their equipment, vehicles, and personnel to the public in order to educate them about police duties and responsibilities. Some of those agencies in attendance included the Lower Gwynedd Township Police Department,

Police Department, the Pennsylvania State Police, Fort Washington Volunteer Fire Company, Ambler Community Ambulance, the Eastern Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team, and the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety. The most popular attraction for this year's event was the "Dunk a Cop" dunk tank. Patrol Commander Darren Nyce and Officer Andrew Rowland both braved the chilly temperatures and each served their time being dunked into a pool of cold water. After about a half hour they were quite cold and some said that they could hear them shivering in the Borough of Ambler. This was the first year that Officers Stephen Dempsey and Andrew Rowland as well as Police Communications Officer Ryan Copelin coordinated the event and they did an excellent job.

#### School Safety Program

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has developed a School Safety Program based upon "best practices" when protecting those within any school facility in Upper Dublin Township. The School Safety Program has trained teachers, staff, and students on how to properly respond to a variety of incidents that could happen within a school.

The Department has designated the Professional Standards Officer as the liaison between the Department and any school administrator within Upper Dublin Township when questions or concerns arise about school safety. The Professional Standards Officer receives continuous training on school safety from a variety of respected sources. With regards to the Upper Dublin School District, the District's Facility & Community Affairs Manager meets regularly with the Professional Standards Officer to discuss school safety in

order to ensure that all of the involved parties are prepared to respond to an emergency within an Upper Dublin School District school facility.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has also made it a priority to ensure that all Upper Dublin Police Officers are properly trained and prepared to respond to any incident that could happen within a school. All Upper Dublin Police vehicles are equipped with specialized emergency equipment should an incident arise that requires a rapid police response.

In addition, Chief Thompson has made it a priority that throughout the year, Upper Dublin Police Officers conduct daily "foot patrols" and "premise checks" of school facilities. The foot patrols and premise checks provide for an increased police presence within school facilities.

Since the Upper Dublin Township Police Department is committed to the "Community Oriented Policing" philosophy, having Upper Dublin Police Officers within a school permits students, teachers, and staff to interact with Upper Dublin Police Officers on an almost daily basis. This interaction has created relationships that have led to crime prevention, problem-solving, community engagement, and community partnerships.

#### Youth Field Day

On Wednesday, August Upper 7. 2013 the **Dublin Township Police** Department held annual Youth Field Day the Pavilion at Mondauk Commons Park. The Youth Field Day is coordinated by Detective Michael Scarpato and the Upper Dublin Township Parks and Recreation Department. The Youth



Field Day events included kickball, relay races, water relay races, a Frisbee throw, and the final event - a game of Tug-of-War between the police officers and children. This was then followed by a barbeque and an awards

ceremony. This year, the weather was perfect, no one got hurt, and everyone had a great time!

In addition, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has recently instituted the following Community Policing Initiatives:

#### • Lethality Assessment Program

In 2013, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department voluntarily instituted the Lethality Assessment Program (LAP), created by the Maryland Network against Domestic Violence. The LAP is an innovative prevention strategy to reduce domestic violence homicides and serious injuries. It provides an easy and effective method for police officers to identify victims of domestic violence who are at the highest potential for being seriously injured or killed by their intimate partners and immediately connect them to the domestic violence service provider in their area. The LAP is a multipronged intervention program that consists of a research-based lethality screening tool, an accompanying referral protocol that provides direction for the screener based on the results of the screening process, and follow-up contact and other best practices and protocols.


#### Youth Aid Panel

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has in place a Youth Aid Panel. The Youth Aid Panel consists of volunteers from the community who have undergone training in voluntarily overseeing youthful offenders when they have a minor or first offense. Juveniles who are referred to the Youth Aid Panel are required to meet with the panel along with their parents and after an assessment, they are assigned to a program which they must successfully complete or they are returned to court for the original charge. The Youth Aid Panel meets regularly at the Upper Dublin Police Department. The Youth Aid Panel plays a vital role within the Upper Dublin community since it permits youthful first-time offenders to avoid the criminal justice system and further participation in criminal activity.

## Fiscal Responsibility

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is aware of the impact police services have on the Upper Dublin Township budget. Every member of the Department seeks to be fiscally responsible. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is constantly applying for alternate sources of financial support for equipment, technology, training, and personnel. The Department applies for grant funding through federal, state, and local agencies that have programs directed for law enforcement activities. To date the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has secured grant monies in excess of \$ 1,000,000.00. These grant funds directly reduce the amount of tax dollars that fund police operations.



## Hiring

In order for a vacant police officer position within the Upper Dublin Township Police Department to be filled, Civil Service rules established by the Upper Dublin Township Civil Service Commission must be followed. Candidates for the position of police officer must be placed onto the Civil Service list that is compiled after a candidate has successfully completed the following: a written test, an interview with members of the police department which consists of supervisors and command staff, a physical fitness test, an in-depth background investigation, a polygraph test and a psychological as well as medical exam. Once the candidate has been selected and appointed to the position of probationary police officer, that person is then assigned to attend a Municipal Police Academy or if already certified, placed directly into the Department's Field Training and Evaluation Program. The above process is long and arduous and typically takes up to one year to complete.

In 2013, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department was authorized by the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners to fill two police officer vacancies.

On Wednesday, March 13, 2013 Stephen Nick, was sworn-in by District Judge Patricia Zaffarano as an Upper Dublin Police Officer. Officer Stephen Nick was assigned badge #93. Officer Nick is originally from Long Island. New York.



Officer Nick attended Villanova University where he earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in History and a Master's of Science Degree in Law Enforcement Management and Administration from Saint Joseph's University. In July 2011, Officer Nick graduated, at the top of his class, from the Montgomery County Community College's Municipal Police Academy. Prior to being hired by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department, Officer Nick worked as an Emergency Medical Technician for Montgomery County Emergency Services and as a part-time Police Officer in Lansdowne

Borough, Delaware County. After successfully completing the Field Training and Evaluation Program, Officer Nick was assigned to Platoon C, supervised by Sergeant Michael Janoski. Officer Nick is a fine officer who has done an outstanding job protecting the Upper Dublin Township community.

On Tuesday, May 14, 2013 Gregory Borgmann was joined by family and friends, as he was sworn-in by District Judge Patricia Zaffarano as an Upper Dublin Police Officer. Officer Borgmann was assigned #94. Officer badge Borgmann is from Warminster. Bucks

Officer Borgmann graduated from the Montgomery County Community College's Municipal Police Academy prior to being hired by the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. After successfully completing the Field Training and Evaluation Program, Officer Borgmann was assigned to Platoon A, supervised by Sergeant Andrew Lavenberg. Officer Borgmann is looking forward to serving the residents of Upper Dublin Township for many years.

## **Statistics**

Statistical information assists with predicting or realizing criminal activity, crash locations, traffic concerns, and other public safety issues. Statistical information is also used to address day-to-day assignments and training needs as well as assist with long range operational and fiscal planning. Although statistics provide a means to examine data, there are often normal fluctuations in crime data that do not indicate fundamental changes in crime rates. Over longer terms, statistical studies show that certain trends are cyclical in nature and tend to follow national trends and events. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consistently monitors all available statistical data in order to determine true trends so that once they are identified they are addressed accordingly.





**Table 11. Directed Patrols, Property Checks, and Foot Patrols** 




➤ The graph above displays officer initiated proactive policing activities.

**Table 12. Alarm Activations and False Alarms** 





**Table 13. Traffic Citations and Warnings Issued** 




➤ The graph above displays the traffic citations or warnings that were issued as a result of a vehicle code violation by a motorist.

**Table 14. Reportable and Non-Reportable Crashes** 








