





The Community We Serve: Upper Dublin Township

Upper Dublin Township is located within Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. There are approximately 26,000 people who reside within this 13.2 square mile community. Most of the land within Upper Dublin developed Township been into has communities single-family of homes, townhouses, shopping centers, educational institutions, park and recreational areas, and the Fort Washington Office Park. residents of Upper Dublin Township are served by the School District of Upper Dublin. There are major arteries (i.e. The Pennsylvania Turnpike, Routes 309, 152, and pass through Upper Dublin 63) that Township and mass transit is available through the Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority. Upper Dublin Township is a highly desirable community to live and work.



About Us: The Upper Dublin Township Police Department

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

Department is charged with the The protection of life and property within Upper Township. Upper Dublin The Dublin Township Police Department is a Pennsylvania first class, civil service. accredited, law enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours a day, 7 days a week, the Department employs 40 full-time sworn police officers, 6 Police Communication Officers. a Records Clerk and Administrative Assistant to fulfill its mission. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is dispatched to "Calls for Service" by the Montgomery County Communications Center.

The Upper Dublin Township Department consists of two primary divisions identified as Administration and Patrol, with support units identified three Communications, Detectives, and Records, well as several specialized units addressing Bicycle Patrol, Highway Patrol, Major Incident Response, Medical Response, Enforcement. **Professional Narcotics** Standards, and Tactical Response.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department maintains a "Community Oriented Policing" philosophy through the dedication and service of its members.

Administrative Division

The Administrative Division is supervised by Deputy Chief of Police Ralph (Lee) Benson. The Administrative Division is responsible for budgeting. communications. data processing, facilities management, personnel, statistics. purchasing, and The Administrative Division consists of Communications. Detectives and Records personnel.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is supervised by Lieutenant Darren Nyce who serves as the Patrol Commander. The Patrol Division is comprised of 31 sworn officers. There are four seven officer squads, each under the direction of a Sergeant with support provided by a Corporal which allows for a clear and concise chain-of- command. In addition, the Patrol Division also consists of a Highway Patrol Unit and the Professional Standards Officer.

Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation

The Dublin Upper Township Police Department, under the direction of Chief of Police Terrence P. Thompson, first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. Since then, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department received initial accreditation in May of 2005 and has accredited status retained its with assessments and certifications in July of 2008 and June of 2011 and 2014.

The Pennsylvania Chiefs of**Police** Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, of the 1,150 law enforcement agencies within Pennsylvania, approximately 300 agencies have enrolled in the program approximately 100 agencies are accredited. The members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department are proud to have attained this distinguished status.

According the Pennsylvania to Enforcement Accreditation Commission's website, the accreditation program was designed and developed by professional law executives provide enforcement to reasonable and cost effective plan for professionalizing law enforcement agencies within the Commonwealth. Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their performance. When the proper overall policies and procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals is assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision bv an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.






Community Events & Programs

The objective of the College Internship Program is to provide a positive learning environment, in which interested college students can




Field Day






Awards


On Wednesday, January 28, 2015, there was a multi-alarm fire at the





Facts & Figures

Statistical information assists with predicting or realizing criminal activity, crash locations, traffic concerns, and other public safety issues. Statistical information is also used to address day-to-day assignments and training needs as well as assist with long range operational and fiscal planning. Although statistics provide a means to examine data, there are often normal fluctuations in crime data that do not indicate fundamental changes in crime rates. Over longer terms, statistical studies show that certain trends are cyclical in nature and tend to follow national trends and events. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consistently monitors all available statistical data in order to determine true trends so that once they are identified they are addressed accordingly.





The Uniform Crime Reporting Program collects statistics on the number of offenses known to law enforcement. In the traditional Summary Reporting System, there are eight crimes, or Part I Offenses, (murder and nonnegligent homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft, larceny-theft, and arson) that are to be reported to the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. These offenses were chosen because they are serious crimes, they occur




with regularity in all areas of the country, and they are likely to be reported to police.







