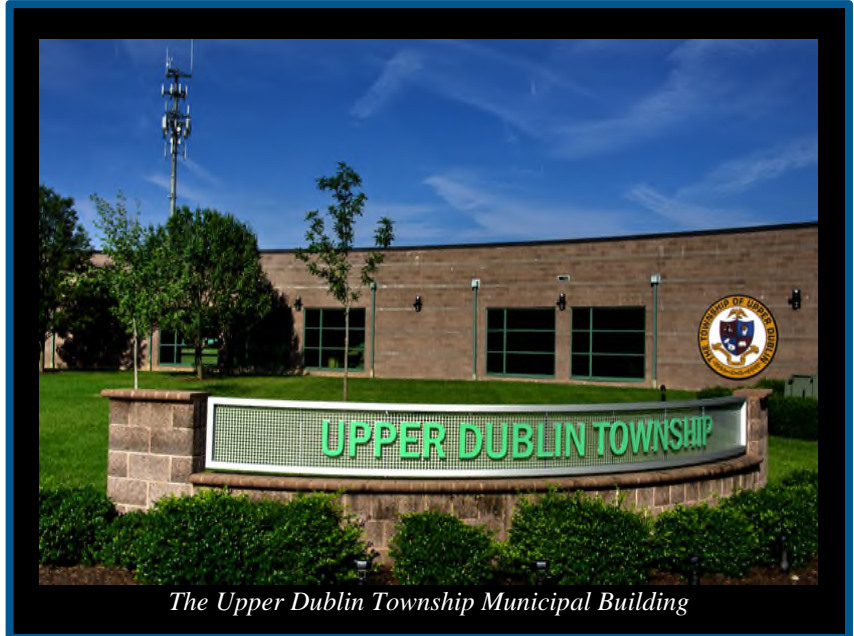

About Us

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

The Department is charged with the protection of life and property within Upper Dublin Township. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a first class, civil service, accredited, law enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours-a-day, 7 days-a-week, the Department employs forty (40) full-time police officers and a support staff of six (6) full-time and six (6) part-time civilian personnel. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consists of two (2) primary divisions identified as Administration

and Patrol along with five (5) support units identified as Communications, Detectives, Highway Patrol, Professional Standards, and Records. The Department also has several specialized units addressing Bicycle Patrol, Major Incident Response, Medical Response, Narcotics Enforcement, and Tactical Response. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is dispatched to “Calls for Service” by the Montgomery County Communications Center (911).

The Administrative Division consists of the Command Staff, Communications, Detectives, Professional Standards, and Records personnel. Within the Administrative Division there are nine (9) sworn members of the police department.

The Patrol Division consist of the most visible members of the Department since it is their responsibility to respond to all “Calls for Service,” apprehend and arrest offenders, conduct preliminary criminal investigations as well vehicle crash investigations and traffic enforcement, identify hazardous conditions and conduct community policing activities within Upper Dublin Township. There are four (4) platoons, each of which have five (5) police officers assigned who are under the direction of a Sergeant with support provided by a Corporal, which allows for a clear and concise chain-of-command. In addition, the Patrol Division also consists of a Traffic Safety Unit whose Traffic Safety Officers are responsible for enhancing the safety of motorists and pedestrians in Upper Dublin Township.

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department maintains a “Community Oriented Policing” philosophy through the dedication and service of its members.



Specialized Units

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has many specialized units that allow the Department to achieve and maintain high standards of policing and provide additional services to the Upper Dublin Township community. The Upper Dublin Police Officers who are members of a specialized unit take on those responsibilities in addition to the responsibilities associated with their primary assignment of Administration or Patrol. There is a minimal cost (i.e. training and minor equipment) to have each specialized unit; however the additional services provided to the Upper Dublin Township community by the Upper Dublin Police Officers assigned to each specialized unit are invaluable. Table 1 displays the specialized units within the Upper Dublin Township Police Department.

The Department strives to offer a quality educational experience by providing the student with a "hands-on" learning environment and enhancing their understanding of the criminal justice system.

Junior Police Academy & Field Day Program

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department held its 22st annual Junior Police Academy & Field Day program from Monday, August 7, 2017 through Wednesday, August 9, 2017. This year there was over 75 participants who took part in the Junior Police Academy and Field Day program.

The Junior Police Academy took place on Monday, August 7th and Tuesday, August 8th. The Junior Police Academy was coordinated by Detective Michael Scarpato, with assistance from Patrol Officer David Madrak and Patrol Officer Andrew Bochanski as well as Administrative Assistant Ryan Copelin. The events for this year's Junior Police Academy included a tour of the police station, a police vehicle, a Fort Washington Volunteer Fire Company fire engine, and an Ambler Community Ambulance Association ambulance.

In addition, there was a K-9 demonstration given by the Abington Township Police Department's K-9 Unit as well as a JeffSTAT helicopter landing and tour. In addition, a tactical demonstration was given by Patrol Officer Peter Bullock of the Upper Dublin Police Department on behalf of the Montgomery County Special Weapons and Tactics Team – East Region. At the conclusion of the program there was an awards ceremony, a pizza party, and a bicycle rodeo.

On Wednesday, August 9th, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department held its annual Field Day at the Pavilion in Mondauk Commons Park. Field Day is coordinated by Detective Michael Scarpato and the Upper Dublin Township Parks and Recreation Department. All of this was then followed by a barbeque and an awards ceremony.

Medication Collection Program

The Upper Dublin Police Department, in partnership with the Montgomery County District Attorney’s office, has a Med Return Drug Collection Unit (Medication Drop-Box) in the lobby of the Department. This Medication Drop-Box offers a safe way for residents of Upper Dublin Township and the surrounding communities to anonymously dispose of unwanted or expired medication. In addition, the Department participates in the bi-annual Drug Enforcement Agency’s (DEA) “Drug Take Back Initiative” in which medication in larger quantities is collected.

The purpose of the Medication Collection Program is to provide a consistent system for removing unwanted medications from homes and allowing for the proper disposal of these products. The medication collection is 100% anonymous and is always available for use by the public. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department collected more than 500lbs. of prescribed and “over-the-counter” medication.

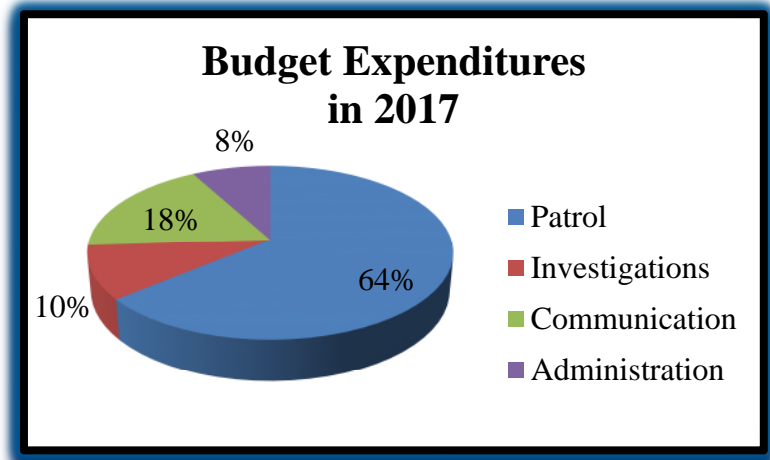

In the Spotlight

Badge, Patch, and Uniform

On March 1, 2017 the Upper Dublin Township Police Department introduced its new badge, patch, and most of all uniform to the Upper Dublin Township community.

Approximately 1 year prior to that date, Patrol Officer David Madrak was tasked with evaluating various uniform suppliers. Eventually, Mike Bucks, from Reds the Uniform Tailor, was contacted and met with then Deputy Chief Lee Benson, Lieutenant Darren Nyce, and Patrol Officers David Madrak, and Michael Ciuffetelli in order to discuss uniform options.

After multiple meetings with and comments from the members of the Department, it was determined that the Department's badge and patch would be revised and the uniform would change from blue to gray and black. The badge has been revised and now clearly states "Upper Dublin Police" and the patch has been enhanced with new a font, coordinating colors, and clearly states "Montgomery County, PA." The uniform now consists of a gray shirt with blue hash marks and black pants with a ¾ inch corresponding gray stripe. All Supervisors and Patrol Officers now wear silver badges and nameplates with silver buttoned leather duty gear. Command Staff members now wear gray or white shirts with either blue or gold hash marks, gold badges and name plates and black pants with a ¾ inch corresponding gray stripe that has gold pin stripes as its border. In addition, the hats are crushed hats with gray stripes and have a black band for Patrol Officers, silver band for Supervisors, and gold band for Command Staff. The uniforms are 55% polyester and 45% wool. In addition, Outer Vest Carriers are able to be worn as well. Finally, the Department has changed to Blauer outerwear for jackets, coats, and hats. The Department has received many positive comments from the public, Upper Dublin Township administrators and most of all Upper Dublin Police Officers.





Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation

On Friday, June 2, 2017, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department successfully completed the requirements necessary to be re-accredited for a three-year term by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission. The Department was officially recognized for their accomplishments by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association in July. This was the Department's first re-accreditation assessment under the direction of Chief Benson, who was the Department's first Accreditation Manager when the



Department originally became accredited in May of 2005. Since then the Department has been re-accredited in July of 2008, June of 2011, June of 2014 and now in June of 2017. Congratulations to Patrol Officer David Madrak who has served as the Department's Accreditation Manager since 2009 and to all of the members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department on this accomplishment.

Vision 2020 – A Staffing Analysis for 2017 & Beyond

In July of 2017, the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners directed the Upper Dublin Township Police Department to conduct an evaluation of the Department's staffing. A Staffing Study committee was formed and published Vision 2020: A Staffing Analysis for 2017 & Beyond. The Staffing Study committee was under the direction of Chief of Police Lee Benson and consisted of the Deputy Chief of Police Daniel Wade, Lieutenant Darren Nyce, Sergeant Andrew Lavenberg, Corporal John Sullivan, Patrol Officer David Madrak, and Patrol Officer Thomas Szybowski.

In order to meet the needs, desires, and expectations of the Upper Dublin Township community the Staffing Study committee recommended that three (3) additional police officers be hired and a Community Response Unit (CRU) be formed. The CRU would be responsible for improving quality of life issues while simultaneously forming and in some cases improving relationships with all the Upper Dublin Township community. The CRU would be a multi-faceted unit designed to focus on community concerns within the Upper Dublin Township, to include but not be limited to community oriented policing activities, traffic enforcement and safety initiatives, and address quality of life crimes such as the opioid epidemic that has been highlighted on several occasions by both Pennsylvania Attorney General Josh Shapiro and Montgomery County District Attorney Kevin Steele.

Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation

Accreditation programs strive to promote quality practices in public safety services, primarily by maintaining a body of standards developed by public safety practitioners covering a wide range of contemporary public safety initiatives; establishing and administering an accreditation process; and recognizing professional excellence. The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, of the approximate 1,150 law enforcement agencies within Pennsylvania, approximately 300 agencies have enrolled in the program and approximately 115 agencies are accredited. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. Since then, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department received initial accreditation in May of 2005 and has retained its accredited status with assessments and certifications in July of 2008 and June of 2011, 2014, and 2017.



Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The cornerstone of this strategy lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives. There are many benefits to law enforcement agencies attaining accreditation status. Some of these benefits include: establishing a credible framework for evaluating agency practices and procedures, reducing agency risk and exposure to lawsuits, reducing officer injury, decreasing some liability insurance expenditures, improving law enforcement – community relations, increasing employee input, interaction, and confidence in the agency, expanding the outlook and viewpoints of all employees, identifying and highlighting the capabilities and competence of the agency, furnishing a solid foundation for the agency to build upon for further progress, providing reliable methods to improve essential management procedures, extending agency accountability to the public, enhancing planning and innovative activities by all agency personnel, developing improved methods for providing services to the community, and encouraging problem-solving activities within the agency. The members of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department are proud to have attained the distinguished status of being an accredited law enforcement agency.

Personnel

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is authorized to have a staff of fifty-two (52) employees (members); forty (40) sworn (police officers) and a support staff of twelve (12) (six (6) full-time and six (6) part-time) non-sworn (civilian) personnel. Each employee has a critical function or role to fulfill and has a job description to specifically detail their assigned tasks. In addition, each employee has a supervisor assigned to them whose role it is to supervise and evaluate their activity on a daily basis in order to ensure that any issues are addressed and performance is optimum. 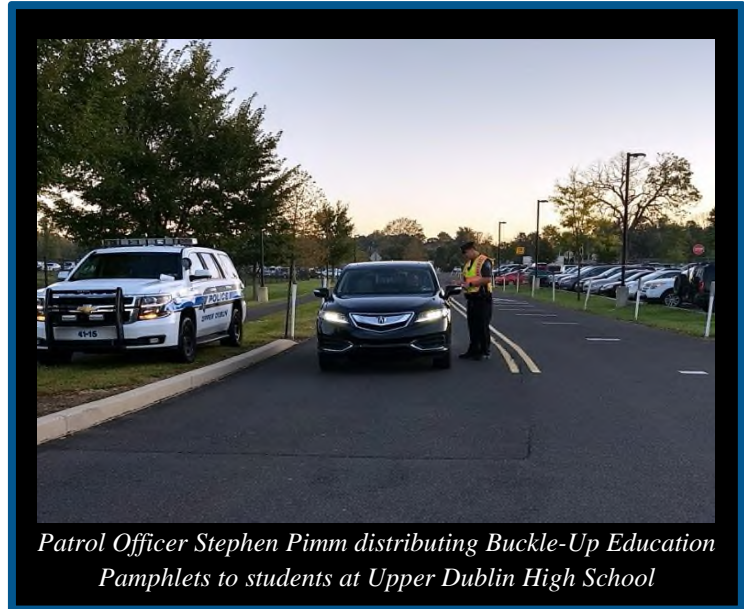

Commendations

Life Saving Citation: Patrol Officer Michael Milligan

On Friday, March 17, 2017 Upper Dublin Police Officers were dispatched to a disturbance in the Ambler section of Upper Dublin Township. Following an investigation, a man was placed into police custody due to his state of intoxication. While seated in the back of the police vehicle, the once loud and animated individual had suddenly become immediately silent. Patrol Officer Michael Milligan rushed to the man's aid and found him not breathing and without a pulse. He immediately began resuscitative efforts and did revive the man prior to the arrival of Emergency Medical Services.

On Saturday, April 1, 2017, a robbery occurred at the CVS Pharmacy in the Dresher section of Upper Dublin Township. A man had approached an employee and threatened to throw a cup of acid into the face of the employee if they didn't turn over the cash. Responding Upper Dublin Police Officers obtained a detailed description of the suspect and the suspect's vehicle and broadcast that description to other area police departments. Patrol Officer Chad Smith of the Cheltenham Township Police Department heard this broadcast and believed it to be the same suspect who committed a similar robbery in Upper Moreland Township the day before.

Patrol Officer Smith moved to a location where he could intercept that vehicle if it fled towards Philadelphia as was the case the previous day. A short time later, the vehicle passed Patrol Officer Smith and police were able to stop the vehicle and arrest the suspect without incident. The subsequent investigation revealed that this career criminal was indeed responsible for another robbery the day prior.

On Tuesday, February 21, 2017, at 0320 hours Sergeant Timothy Urner of the Ambler Borough Police Department was flagged down by a citizen who reported that the 7-11 store in Ambler had just been robbed by three armed individuals. Police officers from Ambler Borough, Lower Gwynedd, Upper Dublin and Whitpain Townships responded to the location as did a K-9 Unit from Cheltenham Township. The K-9 team helped identify the direction of flight of the suspects and identified crucial evidence.

Approximately 12 minutes after the report of the robbery, Patrol Officer Francis Rippert observed the suspects' vehicle and together with other responding police officers, stopped the vehicle and arrested the three men who were in the vehicle. Detectives in this case would later collect more than 550 pieces of physical evidence connecting the men to this robbery, and an additional eight other armed robberies in Bucks, Montgomery and Philadelphia Counties.

On Wednesday November 23, 2016, emergency personnel were dispatched to a residential fire in the unit block of Douglass Street. Upon arrival, Upper Dublin Police Officers observed that there were lights on and a dog barking in the adjoining twin home. Forced entry was made into the residence by the Upper Dublin Police Officers on-scene and they subsequently conducted a search for potential victims. Upper Dublin Police Officers successfully rescued the family's golden retriever and then treated that dog and another dog that had been rescued by firefighters for smoke inhalation until the animals were able to be transported transport for further treatment.

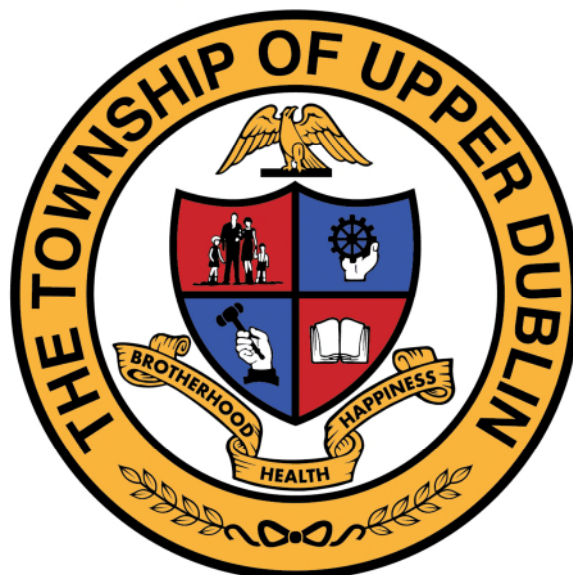
