Upper Dublin Township is located within Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. There are approximately 26,000 people who reside within this 13.2 square mile community. Most of the land within Upper Dublin Township has been developed into communities of single-family homes, townhouses, shopping centers, educational institutions, park and recreational areas, and the Fort Washington Office Park. The residents of Upper Dublin Township are served by the School District of Upper Dublin. There are major arteries (i.e.

About Us

The Upper Dublin Township Police Department was established in 1928 by resolution of the Upper Dublin Township Board of Commissioners.

The Department is charged with the protection of life and property within Upper Dublin Township. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is a first class, civil service, accredited, law enforcement agency. Staffed 24-hours-a-day, 7 days-a-week, the Department employs forty (40) full-time police officers and a support staff of six (6) full-time and two (2) part-time civilian personnel. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department consists of two (2) primary divisions identified as Administration and Patrol along with five (5) support units identified as Communications, Detectives, Traffic Safety Unit, Professional Standards, and Records. The Department also has several specialized units addressing Bicycle Patrol, Major Incident Response, Medical Response, Narcotics Enforcement, and Tactical Response. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department is dispatched to “Calls for Service” by the Montgomery County Communications Center (911).



The Administrative Division consists of the Command Staff, Communications, Detectives, Professional Standards, and Records personnel. Within the Administrative Division there are nine (9) sworn members of the police department.

The Patrol Division consists of the most visible members of the Department. It is their responsibility to respond to all “Calls for Service,” apprehend and arrest offenders, conduct preliminary criminal investigations as well as vehicle crash investigations and traffic enforcement, identify hazardous conditions and conduct community policing activities within Upper Dublin Township.

There are four (4) platoons, each of which have five (5) police officers assigned who are under the direction of a Sergeant with support provided by a Corporal, which allows for a clear and concise chain-of-command. The Patrol Division also consists of a Traffic Safety Unit whose Traffic Safety Officers are responsible for enhancing the safety of motorists and pedestrians in Upper Dublin Township.



The Upper Dublin Township Police Department has many specialized units that allow the Department to achieve and maintain high standards of policing and provide additional services to the Upper Dublin Township community. The Upper Dublin Police Officers who are members of a specialized unit take on those responsibilities in addition to the responsibilities associated with their primary assignment of Administration or Patrol. There is a cost (i.e. training and minor equipment) to have each specialized unit; however the additional services provided to the Upper Dublin Township community by the Upper Dublin Police Officers assigned to each specialized unit are invaluable.

Each employee of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has a critical function or role to fulfill and has a job description to specifically detail their assigned tasks. In addition, each employee has a supervisor assigned to them whose role it is to supervise and evaluate their officers' activity on a daily basis in order to ensure that any issues are addressed and performance is optimum. Lastly and of the utmost importance, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department is able to maintain a "Community Oriented Policing" philosophy through the dedication and service of its members.

Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation

Accreditation programs strive to promote quality practices in public safety services, primarily by maintaining a body of standards developed by public safety practitioners covering a wide range of contemporary public safety initiatives, establishing and administering an accreditation process, and recognizing professional excellence. The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program to the Commonwealth in July 2001. Since then, of the approximate 1,150 law enforcement agencies within Pennsylvania, approximately 300 agencies have enrolled in the program and approximately 115 agencies are accredited. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department first embarked on becoming an accredited agency in the fall of 2003. Since then, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department received initial accreditation in May of 2005 and has retained its accredited status with assessments and certifications in 2008, 2011, 2014, and 2017.



Community Oriented Policing

While the primary duty of the Upper Dublin Township Police Department is to focus upon crime control and prevention, the Department continues to develop and refine community oriented policing activities. The Upper Dublin Township Police Department subscribes to a philosophy of “Community Oriented Policing.” It is the goal of the Department to establish a collaborative effort between the Department and the Upper Dublin Township community in order to work together to identify and solve community problems. Through a “Community Oriented Policing” philosophy, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department seeks to enhance the quality of life and safety of those who live and work in Upper Dublin Township.

Appointment

On Tuesday, June 19, 2018, Patrol Officer David Madrak was nominated and subsequently appointed to serve as a member on the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC). Since 2008 Officer Madrak has served as the Upper Dublin Township Police Department's Professional Standards Officer. As the Professional Standards Officer, one of Officer Madrak's responsibilities is to manage the Department's status within the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association's Law Enforcement Accreditation program. Under Officer Madrak's guidance the Upper Dublin Township Police Department has been re-accredited on four occasions. In addition, he has assisted a number of police departments in Southeastern Pennsylvania become or retain their accredited status with PLEAC.

Assignments

Detective Unit

In February of 2018, two members of the Patrol Division were transferred to the Detective Unit. Sergeant Andrew Lavenberg, formerly a Patrol Sergeant, was assigned as the Detective Unit's supervisor and Detective Kevin Shanahan, previously a Patrol Officer, was assigned to be a Detective; both assignments are lateral transfers within the Department.



College Internship Program

The Upper Dublin Township Police is one of only a small number of law enforcement agencies in the region to offer a College Internship Program. Through the College Internship Program, the Department builds partnerships with colleges and universities; and ultimately benefits, along with the interns, from shared educational experiences.

The objective of the College Internship Program is to provide a positive learning environment, in which interested college students can experience the various aspects and responsibilities of law enforcement while completing a project as part of their studies. The Department strives to offer a quality educational experience by providing the student with a "hands-on" learning environment and enhancing their understanding of the criminal justice system.

Graduation

On Friday, December 14, 2018, Deputy Chief of Police, Daniel Wade, graduated from the 274th session of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) National Academy. This 10-week program provides coursework in intelligence theory, terrorism and terrorist mindsets, management science, law, behavioral science, law enforcement communication, and forensic science; it serves to improve the administration of justice in police departments and agencies at home and abroad and to raise law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation worldwide. Leaders and managers of federal, state, county, local, tribal, military, and international law enforcement agencies attend the FBI National Academy. Participation is by invitation only through a nomination process. Participants are drawn from every state and territory in the United States and from international partner nations as well.



In addition, Deputy Chief Wade was awarded a "Yellow Brick" after successfully completing the "Yellow Brick Road." The Yellow Brick Road is the final test of the a fitness challenge, which includes a grueling 6.1-mile run through a hilly, wooded trail built by the United States Marine Corps. While completing the challenge, each participant must climb over walls, run through creeks, jump through simulated windows, scale rock faces with ropes, crawl under barbed wire in muddy water, maneuver across a cargo net, and more. As background, the fitness challenge began at the National Academy in 1981 and has evolved over the years; yellow bricks began being award in 1988.



Deputy Chief Wade began his career with the Upper Dublin Township Police Department as an Intern in 1996. Upon his graduation from Temple University, he was hired by the Department as a non-sworn employee. In 1998, Deputy Chief Wade applied and was hired as a police officer with the Upper Dublin Township Police Department. Since then, Deputy Chief Wade has served in various roles within the department to include Patrol Officer, Detective, and Sergeant. While serving as a Sergeant, Deputy Chief Wade attended Northwestern University's School of Police Staff and Command, from which he graduated in 2014. On Tuesday, May 9, 2017, then – Sergeant Wade was promoted to Deputy Chief of Police. As Deputy Chief of Police, Deputy Chief Wade is responsible for supervising the Administrative Division.

Statistics

On Monday, June 25, 2018, the Upper Dublin Township Police Department transitioned to a new Records Management System. The Records Management System is officially known as the Advanced Law Enforcement Intelligence System (ALEIS). According to the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety, ALEIS is unique since it is hosted by the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety; ALEIS was created on their behalf by CSI Technology Group of Keasbey, New Jersey. ALEIS is the result of a nine-year effort that required the cooperation of the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office, Montgomery County Detective Bureau, and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Department, as well as the Police Chiefs Association of Montgomery County.

As a result of ALEIS, Upper Dublin Police Officers now have direct interfaces with the Montgomery County Department of Public Safety's Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) System, E-ticketing (via United Public Safety), Commonwealth Law Enforcement Network (CLEAN), Crash Reporting, LiveScan (via DataWorks), Law Enforcement Justice Information System (LEJIS), and The Pennsylvania Justice Network (JNET). In addition, ALEIS provides for many of the Department's internal computing needs with modules for case management of "Calls for Service," fleet management, the master indexing of information, and the tracking of arrests and warrants, as well as Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR), and crime linking and analysis.

As the Department continues to develop a reliable database of information within ALEIS, the capabilities of ALEIS will be fully recognized and leveraged to allow for statistical information to assist with predicting or realizing criminal activity, crash locations, traffic concerns, and other public safety issues. The statistical information gathered will then be utilized to address daily assignments as well as assist with operational and fiscal planning. Tables 4 through 12 displays various statistics that pertain to the Upper Dublin Township Police Department.
